

Writing Placement Testing: Interpreting Your Results

Score	Placement	Description
1	ENG-099 Basic English	The placement essay indicates the writer would benefit from facilitated practice on syntax and basic conventions of Standard Edited English (SEE), critical strategies for logical sequencing, and development of written ideas.
2	ENG-101 English Composition & Required ENG-L01 Noncourse equivalency in MUHUB: ENG-101P (no credit, allows registration)	The placement essay indicates the writer requires instruction focusing on written fluency, academic conventions, topic development, and organizational coherence <u>prior</u> to entrance into ENG-112. Successful completion of ENG-L01 is required to in order to pass ENG-101.
3	ENG-112 & Required ENG-L01 Noncourse equivalency in MUHUB: ENG-112P (no credit, allows registration)	The placement essay indicates the writer requires supplemental instruction in developing topics and organizing ideas logically and purposefully.
4	ENG-112 & Recommended ENG-L12 Noncourse equivalencies in MUHUB: ENG-112P, ENG-LEX (no credit, allows registration)	The placement essay indicates the writer is likely prepared to enter ENG-112. However, the writing sample contains evidence of potential concerns related to substantiation, specificity, or cohesion and suggests the writer would benefit from the guidance provided through the ENG-L12 Writing Tutorial. <i>**Students who were <u>not</u> required to take writing placement testing due to an ACT/SAT score above the cutoff should take ENG-112.**</i>
5	ENG-112 & Optional ENG-L10 Noncourse equivalencies in MUHUB: ENG-112P, ENG-LEX (no credit, allows registration)	The placement essay indicates the writer is prepared to enter ENG-112. The Writing Tutorial elective hour (ENG-L10) is available to all first-year students. This student may self-select ENG-L10 based on his/her past experiences in writing classes.

Reading Comprehension Subtest:

Primary Purpose: The Nelson-Denny Reading Comprehension Subtest is a survey instrument designed to give a measure of ability specific to reading comprehension.

Scores: The grade equivalent may be interpreted as explained below.

Reading Comprehension: If your score falls beneath 12.1 grade level, you are presently comprehending below the level at which most college texts are written. You may have difficulty reading and understanding your college textbooks.
